MAKE MUSIC - MAKE FRIENDS

The sight-reading sessions have been a regular feature of the IDRS conferences since the Madison conference in 1999. The daily sessions are designed to be fun and stress-free, yet sufficiently challenging to be musically satisfying. An extensive library (hundreds of tunes in many styles and with many different combinations of double reed instruments) is available to facilitate large and small groups of different ability levels. This allows the leaders to select level-appropriate music for the instrumentation present at each session. Every effort is made to challenge advanced players and encourage less experienced players. Publishers, composers, and arrangers constantly contribute to the library, so every year there are new works to read as well as old favorites. The sessions are run in a very informal atmosphere. We encourage you to attend as many or as few as you wish. Please arrive a few minutes early to the sessions if possible, as this facilitates formation of appropriate groups of players.

Dorian Cooke, born in The Hague the Netherlands, studied bassoon at the Royal Conservatory of The Hague with Johan Steinmann. Sean Craypo SAT. 1:00, BATES



Ms. Henderson has been a member of the Colorado Symphony, the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, the American Sinfonietta, and the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra. She has performed as Guest Principal Oboist with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Seattle Symphony Orchestra, the Oregon Symphony Orchestra, and the Rochester Philharmonic. Festival performances include the Aspen, Cabrillo, Bellingham, and Boulder Bach Festivals, and she is currently on the faculty of the Marrowstone Music Festival in Bellingham, Washington, as well as the Round Top Festival in Texas. She has been featured on numerous film scores, including Imax films such as "Everest" and "Olympic Glory." As a soloist and chamber musician she has recorded for the Boston Records, Centaur, RCA Masterworks, and RCWinds labels. Her recently released CD, "...is but a dream," has been hailed by critics as "Exquisite" (Gramophone) and "Superb" (American Record Guide). Ms Henderson holds degrees from the Oberlin Conservatory and the Eastman School of Music, where she was also awarded the distinguished "Performer's Certificate." Her teachers include Richard Henderson, James Caldwell, Richard Killmer, John Mack, John de Lancie, and Grover Schiltz.

Bob Herman TUES. 10:30, RS

Bob Herman is the senior partner of a law firm in St. Louis, Missouri. He has enjoyed playing the oboe and English horn for the last 35 years, and has never been tempted to drop everything and pursue a professional career as a musician. He took his very first oboe lesson from Richard Woodhams when he first arrived in St. Louis. Through the years he studied with August Keller and Mark Gordon, both English Horn with the St. Louis Symphony, and currently studies with oboist Lisa Lalev, of the St. Louis Symphony. Mr. Herman is the Principal Oboist for the University City Symphony, a local community orchestra, and recently performed the Bach Double with the Sociedad Filarmonica de Asunción.

Jaren Hinckley SAT. 4:00, BATES

Jaren Hinckley is the clarinet professor at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah. He received a Doctor of Music Degree from The Florida State University, Tallahassee, Florida, where he studied with Frank Kowalsky. He holds a Masters Degree in Clarinet Performance from Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana where he studied with James Campbell and Howard Klug; and a Bachelor of Music Degree from the University of Utah, where he studied with Christie Lundquist. Other teachers include David M. Randall, John Fullam, and Sonia DeFord. He has recorded two CDs with the Canyonlands New Music Ensemble and the Utah Composers Ensemble— chamber groups dedicated to the advancement of new music. Through his involvement with these groups and others, he has performed the world-premieres of many solo and chamber works. He has created a new approach to music pedagogy based on the acting techniques of Constantin Stanislavski. He is married to Dr. Jane Hinckley of the BYU College of Humanities and they have two beautiful children.

Scott Holshouser MON. 1:30, McC

Scott Holshouser has been the orchestra keyboardist for the Houston Symphony since 1980 and is accompanist for the Houston Symphony chorus. A native of Lexington, Kentucky, he began his musical training in Athens, Georgia with Ina Gerchefski. While attending Florida State University he studied with Leonard Mastrogiacomo and continued studies in Houston with Abbey Simon. His solo appearances include performances with the symphonies of Dallas, Atlanta, and Stavanger, Norway. In the 2003-4 season, he performed the Salieri Piano Concerto with the Houston Symphony and the Rhapsody in Blue with the San Antonio Symphony. With the Houston Symphony he has played over twenty-five solo performances ranging from Bach and Mozart to







Gershwin. Holshouser has been a staff pianist for the Houston Opera and Houston Ballet, and currently serves as staff accompanist for the Houston Symphony (Ima Hogg) auditions, and the Corpus Christi and Kingsville, Texas national music competitions. He is a regular participant in the Grand Teton music festival, playing orchestra and chamber music. He is featured on recordings with clarinetist Richard Nunemaker and violinist Pip Clarke. Holshouser teaches piano on the faculty of the University of Houston. He met his wife Eileen while accompanying the Houston Symphony Chorus, and they have a young son Sean who is a great addition to the family.

Kae Hosada-Ayer SAT. 1:30, MCC

Kae Hosoda-Ayer is presently completing doctoral work at the University of Texas at Austin where she won first prize in the Sidney Wright Endowed Presidential Scholarship Competition in Piano Accompanying. She has been on the accompanying faculty of the New England Conservatory where she performed with Keisuke Wakao of the Boston Symphony, and has concertized throughout the United States and Japan.



Carolyn Hove MON. 2:30, LAW; WED. 7:30, BASS

Carolyn Hove has been the solo English Horn player with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra since 1988. She has long been a champion of New Music beginning with her affiliation with Ralph Shapey and the Contemporary Chamber Players of the University of Chicago and continuing with various other ensembles and venues. In 1996, Crystal Records released her first solo CD entitled *20th Century Music for English Horn and Oboe*. Her second CD, entitled *Ascending to Superlatives*, was released by Crystal Records in 2000 and features the English horn in various chamber settings. Ms. Hove has appeared as a soloist in many venues and has performed numerous U.S. and world premieres. In January of 2003, she performed the world premiere of the *Concerto for English Horn and Orchestra* by William Kraft, with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, a work that was commissioned by the orchestra and written expressly for her. She is presently a faculty member at California State University - Long Beach and she has presented numerous master classes throughout the U.S. and Canada. She currently serves on the Executive Committee of the International Double Reed Society.

Robert Stuart Howe TUES. 9:00, McC

Robert Howe chose a career in medicine, rather than music, because the work is easier and the hours are shorter. An oboe student of Jon Dlouhy, Felix Kraus and Bert Lucarelli, Howe is one of the few American players to be facile on the heckelphone as well as the bass oboe. He has performed with professional and community orchestras in Ohio, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and New England, at the 1994 Orvieto Festival, and as a heckelphonist at meetings of the International Double Reed Society in Greensboro (2003) and of the North American Heckelphone Players' Association in New York (2001-2004). Influenced by studies in acoustics with the late Arthur Benade, Howe's interest in the history of the oboe led him to develop a significant collection of historical woodwinds and an ongoing avocation in organology. Howe has received research grants in organology from H. L. Selmer (Paris) and from the Galpin Society. His work has appeared in such diverse publications as the *Journal of the American Musical Instrument Society*, the *Galpin Society Journal, The Double Reed* (for which he wrote an ongoing series, "Historical Oboes", from 1999-2004), the New England Journal of Medicine, The Journal of Ultrasound in Medicine, Experimental Hematology, Fertility and Sterility, Obstetrics and Gynecology, and National Review. His paper co-authored with Seattle-area heckelphonist Peter Hurd, "The Heckelphone at 100", will appear in the 2004 Journal of the American Musical Instrument Society.



Alan Huckleberry SAT. 2:00, McC

Dr. Alan Huckleberry, Assistant Professor of Piano Pedagogy and Chamber Music at The University of Iowa, has performed both in recitals and as a soloist with orchestras across Europe and the United States. He is also a prizewinner of numerous national and international piano competitions. Dr. Huckleberry is a sought-after chamber musician and master class clinician. Most recently he has performed with saxophonist Donald Sinta, violinist Scott Conklin, and flutists Amy Porter and Alexa Still. He will be conducting piano pedagogy workshops at the upcoming National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy in Chicago, IL.



Terry Lynn Hudson SUN. 1:00, RS

Terry Lynn Hudson holds degrees in Piano Performance from James Madison University, Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and The University of Texas at Austin. She has been a prizewinner in the International Piano Recording Competition of the American College of Musicians, concerto competitions of the Alexandria Symphony Guild and the Virginia Music Teachers Association, and the Sigma Alpha Iota Performance Competition. She has performed solo and collaborative recitals in Austria, Costa Rica, and throughout the United States, and has spoken at conferences of the College Music Society, Music Teachers National Association, and the International Festival for Creative Pianists. Dr. Hudson is on the faculty of Baylor University in Waco, Texas.

Gordon Hunt SAT. 7:30, BASS

Gordon Hunt has had a career in five continents as a soloist and conductor, and also regularly takes master classes and plays with many renowned ensembles. In addition, he has a distinguished orchestral career as Principal Oboe in the Philharmonia and London Chamber Orchestras. Previously he has held the same position in the London Philharmonic, and has also played as Guest Principal with the Berlin Philharmonic. Recognized as one of the world's leading oboists, he appears regularly as soloist with international orchestras, having worked with conductors such as Ashkenazy, Andrew Davis, Giulini, Kondrashin, Muti, Sir John Pritchard, Sir Simon Rattle, Sinopoli, Tate and Welser-Most. A performance of the Mozart Oboe Concerto in Berlin received a standing ovation, and critics wrote that, "With his crystal clear, aristocratic tone, he undoubtedly ranks as one of the greatest exponents of his instrument."

Nicholas Hutchinson TUES. 4:00, BATES

Nicholas Hutchinson, piano, has been a prizewinner in the Kosciuzko Foundation National Chopin Competition and the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition, as well as a finalist in the Oberlin International Piano Competition. He has presented both solo and chamber recitals in New York, Michigan, Ohio, California, Vermont and Arkansas. Mr. Hutchinson is currently pursuing a DMA degree in collaborative piano with Martin Katz at the University of Michigan.

Jennet Ingle TUES. 10:30, McC

As a soloist, Jennet Ingle has been noted for her "extraordinary artistry and virtuosity" (*Illinois Times*) and her "intimacy and spirit of fun" (*State Journal-Register*), through appearances with the Illinois Symphony Orchestra and various recitals in Chicago, Springfield, Valparaiso, and Knoxville. She recently performed on Chicago's Dame Myra Hess concert series, broadcast live on WFMT radio. In October of 2003 she was a semifinalist in the Seventh Tokyo International Oboe Competition, finishing in the top fifteen out of one hundred fifteen applicants worldwide. She has recently completed her second season as Principal Oboe with the Northwest Indiana Symphony Orchestra. Formerly a member of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Jennet has also won a Farwell Award from the Musician's Club of Women. Jennet has also served as Principal Oboe with the Spoleto-USA Festival Orchestra, and can be heard on that group's recording of Kurt Weill's Die Bürgschaft, available on EMI Classics. As a founding member of the Barossa Quintet, she has performed numerous recitals and countless educational presentations in the Chicago Public Schools through the International Music Foundation and the Ravinia Festival's Classical Connections program. Since 1998 she has owned and operated Jennet Ingle Reeds, a growing business specializing in customized oboe, English horn, and oboe d'amore reeds. Jennet is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music, where she studied with Richard Killmer.

Arnold Irchai MON. 2:30, RS

Dr. Irchai received his masters and doctoral degrees at the State Leningrad Conservatory, USSR. From 1974 to 1990, he was Principal Bassoonist of the Moscow Philharmonic Orchestra. Dr. Irchai taught bassoon at the Gnessins Music Pedagogical Institute in Moscow, Russia. Among his awards are the first prize in the All-Russia Music Competition for Woodwind Quintets and the Distinguished Artist of the Russian Federation Award. His recent solo performances include appearances at the Lincoln Center and Kennedy Center. Dr. Irchai's performances have been widely reviewed and featured in local, national, and international mass media. Dr. Irchai was a member of the faculty at both the Washington Conservatory of Music in Washington, DC, and Columbia Union College in Takoma Park, MD. Currently, Dr. Irchai is Assistant Professor of Bassoon at the University of Florida, School of Music and the Principal Bassoon of the National Philharmonic, and the Principal Bassoon of the Central Florida Symphony Orchestra. He is Program Director of the Mount Vernon Music Festival, VA, and a faculty member of the Summit Music Festival, Tarry Town, NY, and International Academy of Music, NY. He is sponsored by Fox Products Corporation.

Yoshi Ishikawa TUES. 7:30, BASS; WED. 1:00, RS

The extent of Yoshi Ishikawa's activities include solo and chamber music recitals and master class presentations in Asia, Europe, Eastern Europe, South America and the Oceania. Ishikawa is the Professor of Bassoon at the University of Colorado at Boulder, College of Music, a position he has held since 1991. A native born Japanese, Ishikawa received his musical training in the US. He attended The University of Michigan, where he earned a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Bassoon Performance, and Northwestern University, where he earned both Master of Music in Bassoon Performance and Bachelor of Music Education degrees.











Nadina Mackie Jackson MON. 10:15, BATES; TUES. 7:30, BASS

Based in Toronto, Nadina performs frequently as a recital soloist and has produced three critically acclaimed solo CDs: *Telemann's Twelve Fantasias, Ever After,* and most recently, *Notes from Abroad* with virtuoso pianist David Swan. Equally at home as a chamber musician Nadina is a founding member of the renowned Caliban Quartet of Bassoonists which has produced two CDs, Bassoonatics and Feast. Her newest chamber group, Musica Franca, will be releasing a two volume CD in December, 2005. As an orchestral musician on both historical and modern bassoon, Nadina records extensively for Naxos with the Aradia Ensemble and tours frequently with Les Violons du Roy. She also played for a decade wth the Montreal Symphony Orchestra, and later, the Canadian Opera Company Orchestra. A graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music, Nadina teaches at the Royal Conservatory of Music and the University of Montreal.

Kristin Wolfe Jensen CO-HOST; TUES. 7:30, BASS

Kristin Wolfe Jensen has been the bassoon professor at the University of Texas at Austin since 1995. The American Record Guide reviewer said of her solo CD *Shadings*, "...She has simply turned in the finest-played Bassoon recital I have ever heard... She obviously sees tone quality as the foundation for her fluent technique...It is a ravishing sound, siren-like in its attractive flair...Ms. Jensen could teach a lot about musicality to a number of famous violinists I know". Her other chamber music and solo recordings can be heard on the Cambria, Opus One, Klavier, and Centaur labels. During the 2001-2002 season, Ms. Jensen was Acting Principal Bassoonist of the Houston Grand Opera, and has also performed with such groups as the San Antonio and Dallas Symphony Orchestras. She has performed solo recitals at several IDRS conferences and has given guest recitals and master classes at a number of major American music schools. In the past, Kristin Wolfe Jensen has served on the faculties of the University of North Texas and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, and has been a member of The Dallas Opera Orchestra, the Nevada Symphony, the Sierra Wind Quintet, Continuum and the Jupiter Symphony of New York. As a student, she won the concerto competitions at the Juilliard School of Music in 1990 and the Oberlin Conservatory in 1989, which led to performances of the Mozart Bassoon Concerto, K. 191.



Lana Johns SUN. 11:00, RS

Lana Johns is Professor of Flute at Mississippi State University. She holds degrees in flute performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and The Florida State University. She has concertized in South America, Europe and throughout the United States, including artist residencies at the Prague Conservatory and performances at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and Carnegie Hall. A specialist in contemporary Czech repertoire for flute, Dr. Johns has collaborations with colleagues Jackie Edwards-Henry, piano and Robert Damm, percussion. Her teachers include Geoffrey Gilbert, Peter Lloyd, and Charles DeLaney.

Abigail Jones SAT. 1:00, BATES

Abigail Jones is originally from Pensacola, Florida where she received her Associate of Arts Degree in Piano and Bassoon from Pensacola Junior College. In 2004 she completed her Bachelor of Music degree at Florida State University, where she studied with Jeff Keesecker. While at FSU she received the Brauchlecht Bright Futures in Music Scholarship and was an active member of the Student Board of Advisors. She is currently studying with Ben Kamins at Rice University where she is associate student coordinator for the JUMP! music inreach program and is on faculty with the Shepherd School Preparatory School of Performing Arts. She has appeared as a soloist with the Central Florida Symphony, the Pensacola Junior College Wind Ensemble, and the Northwest Florida Homeschool Band.



Jerry Junkin TUES. 7:30, BASS

Jerry F. Junkin serves as Director of Bands and the Frank C. Erwin Professor of Music at The University of Texas at Austin, the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Dallas Wind Symphony, as well as Music Director and Conductor of the Hong KongWind Philharmonia. Professor Junkin became conductor of The University of Texas Wind Ensemble in the fall of 1988. Under Mr. Junkin's leadership the UT Wind Ensemble has performed highly acclaimed concerts before the College Band Director's National Association (four times), The American Bandmaster's Association (twice), the Texas Music Educator's Association (four times), and the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles in Manchester; England. Maintaining an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician and lecturer, he has appeared in those capacities in some forty-eight states and on five continents. Mr. Junkin has served as President of the Big 12 Band Director's Association and is a member of the Board of Directors of The John Philip Sousa Foundation, is Immediate Past-President of the American Bandmasters Association, and he is also President of the College Band Directors National Association.

Benjamin Kamins SUN. 7:30, TX EXPERIENCE; MON. 1:30, McC

Benjamin Kamins is currently Professor of Bassoon at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University. He accepted this position in 2003 after having served as Principal Bassoonist of the Houston Symphony for twentytwo years. Before accepting his current position, he taught for sixteen years as a member of the Shepherd School faculty in an adjunct position. After studies with Norman Herzberg in his native Los Angeles, Mr. Kamins began his professional career at age nineteen as Associate Principal Bassoonist of the Minnesota Orchestra. In 2002 he played the world premiere of *Pierrot*, a concerto composed by Larry Lipkis and commissioned for him by the Houston Symphony. In addition to his positions in Minnesota and Houston, he has served as a Guest Principal Bassoonist with the New York Philharmonic and the Boston Symphony. He has also been a faculty member of the Grand Teton Orchestral Seminar, the Pacific and Blossom Music Festivals and is currently spending his summers on the faculty of the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, California and the Festival Institute at Roundtop. A devoted chamber musician, Mr. Kamins was a founding member of the Aurora and Epicurean Wind Quintets. He has toured with the Clarion Wind Quintet and Music from Marlboro. He was a member of the Houston Symphony Chamber Players and is a featured performer on their highly acclaimed recording of the Schoenberg Quintet for Winds.

Jeff Keesecker SUN. 1:30, McC

Jeff Keesecker is currently Professor of Bassoon at Florida State University and Principal Bassoonist with the Tallahassee Symphony Orchestra. Prior to coming to FSU he was a member of the Florida Orchestra in Tampa and taught at the University of South Florida. A native of Sarasota, Florida, where he studied with Trevor Cramer, Mr. Keesecker received a Bachelor of Music from Florida State University, studying with William Winstead, and a Master of Music from The Juilliard School, studying with Steven Maxym. He has been Principal Bassoonist with the Florida West Coast Symphony in Sarasota, Solisti New York, and the St. Gallen (Switzerland) Sinfonie. He is a member of the Opperman Reed Trio at FSU and performs in Europe with The Dorian Consort. He has participated in the Aspen, Waterloo and Sarasota Music Festivals, in the National Repertory Orchestra, and in the New York String Orchestra Seminar. His CD with pianist Hélène Grimaud, *Bassoon Music of the Americas*, features the music of Etler, Siqueira, Osborne, and Villa-Lobos. In the summer of 2005 he will be on the faculty of the Interlochen Arts Camp and will perform with the Swannanoa Chamber Festival in Asheville, North Carolina.

Katherine Kemler SAT. 3:15, McC

Katherine Kemler is Professor of Flute at Louisiana State University and a regular visiting teacher at the Oxford Flute Summer School in England. She has performed as soloist in England, Poland, Switzerland, Canada, China, Hong Kong and throughout the US. A graduate of Oberlin, she received her M.M. and D.M.A. degrees from S.U.N.Y. at Stony Brook. Her major teachers include Samuel Baron, Robert Willoughby, Mark Thomas and William Bennett. She has performed at eight National Flute Association Conventions and has three solo CDs on the Centaur label: *Virtuoso American Flute Works, Sky Loom for Flute* and *Harp and Sonatina*.

Richard Killmer WED. 9:00, BATES

A concert oboist and Professor of Oboe at the Eastman School of Music, Richard Killmer was Principal Oboist of the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra for eleven years. Killmer is also a member the faculty of the Yale School of Music as Visiting Professor of Oboe. His early study of the oboe was in El Paso, Texas, with Richard Henderson, with whom he played in the El Paso Symphony. In 1960 Killmer received a B.A. in Music Education from Colorado State College. Upon graduation he became orchestra director of the Longmont, Colorado public schools, a post he held until entering the U.S.Army in 1962. During his three years in the Army he was principal oboist with the NORAD Band and baritone saxophonist in the NORAD Commander's Dance Band, performing on numerous recordings and television programs. His oboe teachers during his college and Army years were William Gower and David Abosch. After the completion of his service duty, Killmer attended the Yale School of Music where he studied oboe with Robert Bloom and received his M.M., M.M.A., and D.M.A. degrees. He has served as a jury member for the first Lucarelli Oboe Competition, the first Gillet Oboe Competition, and for several International Competitions, including competitions in Geneva, Tokyo, and Prince Edward Island (Canada), as well as competitions in Midland-Odessa, Texas, South Bend, Indiana, and New York City. Principal oboist of the Oklahoma City Symphony from 1967-1970, Killmer has also been principal oboist of the Aspen Festival Orchestra , the Lake Placid Sinfonietta, and the Boston Chamber Music Society, as well as guest first oboe with the Boston Symphony and Boston Pops. During past summers, Killmer has performed at the Mainly Mozart Festival in San Diego, the Banff Centre, and the Sarasota Music Festival. Joining the Eastman School of Music faculty in 1982, Richard Killmer was awarded the School's 1984-1985 Eisenhart Award for Excellence in Teaching.















Nancy Ambrose King, oboe, is the first-prize winner of the Third New York International Competition for Solo Oboists, held in 1995. She has appeared as soloist throughout the world, including appearances with the St. Petersburg Philharmonic, the Janacek Philharmonic, the Internacionale de Musica Orchestra in Buenos Aires, the New York String Orchestra, and the Sinfonia da Camera. She has recorded three solo CDs for Boston Records and two for Cala Records. She was a finalist in the Gillet Competition held in Graz, Austria and has taught and performed in the Sarasota Music Festival, Bowdoin Music Festival, Strings in the Mountains, Idyllwild, and the Hot Springs Music Festival. She is currently Associate Professor of Oboe at the University of Michigan and First Vice-President of the IDRS.





Affectionately referred to as "Patches", Patryce King is a new resident of Austin, Texas. She studied piano performance with James Sifferman at Southeast Missouri State University and piano pedagogy with Mia Kim at Central Missouri State University. As a soloist, King recently won the Centennial Year Scholarship in the Sigma Alpha lota 2003 Scholarship Competition. Her infectious personality and piano skills took Patches to Atlantic City where she represented Missouri for the title of Miss America 1999. Her success as a chamber musician allowed her to perform for NPR's Martin Goldsmith along with trio members Kirk Miller and Liesl Schoenberg.

Alex Klein WED. 4:00, BATES

Grammy-Award winning oboist Alex Klein is the winner of numerous international competitions and has for the last nine years performed as oboe soloist with the Chicago Symphony under Daniel Barenboim. Klein is also the Music Director of the Curitiba Music Workshop in Brazil, directing, performing and teaching in numerous music festivals and other social-educational and cultural events worldwide.

Lynn Kompass MON. 9:30, RS Pianist Lynn Kompass maintains an active c teacher Currently she is an Assistant Profes

Pianist Lynn Kompass maintains an active career as vocal coach, chamber musician, recital collaborator, and teacher. Currently she is an Assistant Professor in the voice department at the University of South Carolina, where she has been teaching since 2002. Ms. Kompass has participated in the Steans Vocal Institute (Ravinia Music Festival), Aspen Music Festival, and the Banff Centre for the Arts, where she worked with Margo Garrett, Roger Vignoles, and Martin Isepp. As an opera coach, Ms. Kompass has worked at the University of Michigan, University of Tennessee, Aspen Opera Theater, and Opera Brasil. Keith Koons has taught clarinet, music appreciation, woodwind chamber music and directs the Early Music Ensemble at The University of Central Florida since 1990. As former Music Director and performer with the UCF-Orlando Shakespeare Festival, he composed and arranged music for plays in a wide variety of styles. Kiyoshi Koyama was born in Japan and studied bassoon at Musashino Academy of Music with Kaoru Yamahata. After graduating from Academy in 1969, he entered the Conservatoire National Superieur de Music de Paris and studied with Maurice Allard and chamber music with Piere Pierlot. In 1971 he received "premier Prix" in both classes. While he was in Paris, he presented recitals at Cite d'Ars Salle Cartot. He had made recordings on the Erato label with famous virtuosi such as Maurice Allard, J.P.Rampal and Jaques Lancelot. Oboist Barbara LaFitte is a familiar face on the Boston music scene. She is Principal Oboist of the Boston Ballet Orchestra and the Boston Classical Orchestra, and plays English horn in the Boston Pops Esplanade Orchestra. She is also a member of the Boston Modern Orchestra Project, and is a regular in Emmanuel Music's Bach Cantata series. Ms. LaFitte is on the faculty of Berklee College of Music in Boston, where she is developing an innovative oboe studio and coaching chamber ensembles. She was appointed to the faculty of Wellesley College as the new oboe instructor in September 2003.

Franck Leblois SUN. 10:00, 2.614; WED. 9:00, RS

Born in 1964, Franck Leblois began studying the bassoon at the age of seventeen at the Tours Music Conservatoire, France. After graduating from J-P Laroque's class at The Superior National Music Conservatoire of Lyon, France in 1993 he obtained his Certificate in Specialised Chamber Music Studies in the same year. In 1994 he attained the qualification of CA, Professeur de Basson (the highest French pedagogical qualification) and went on to win Second Prize at the International Chamber Music Competition of Illzach, France. A member of The Lyric Orchestra of the Grand Theatre of Tours from 1984 to 1998, he now devotes himself principally to chamber music in all its forms and collaborates with composers from all over the world in the creation and promotion of new repertoire for his instrument. In 1998, he founded the association « Fou de basson » (Crazy about Bassoon), of which he is still president and through which he organizes international conferences on Bassoon Pedagogy (1996, 1999, 2002, 2005). A resident of the city of Angoulême, France, where he teaches bassoon and chamber music at the Conservatoire Gabriel Fauré, Franck Leblois is also in demand as both concert artist and pedagogue in both Europe and the Americas.

Anne Leek SUN. 7:30, TX EXPERIENCE; MON. 11:30, BATES

Anne Leek joined the Houston Symphony Orchestra in the fall of 1992 as Associate Principal Oboe. In 1979 Ms. Leek joined the State Philharmonic of Rheinland-Pfalz (Mannheim, W. Germany) as the first female Principal oboist in Germany, a post which she held for ten years during which she became the first American to win the Top Prize at the famed 1982 Geneva International Music Competition, also winning a Special Mozart Interpretation Award. In 1984 Ms. Leek soloed with the New York Philharmonic, becoming the first non-member oboist of the N.Y. Phil. to play a concerto with that orchestra, and the premier performance of the Mozart Oboe







Concerto with this orchestra. In 1989 Ms Leek returned to the USA to take the Pittsburgh Symphony under Lorin Maazel. In 1991 Ms. Leek did the premier of the Vaughn-Williams oboe concerto in Vienna. Since being back in America, she has concertized and recorded with the Boston Symphony (S. Ozawa, J. Williams) and St. Louis Symphony (L. Slatkin). Finland. She has recorded as a soloist as well, most notably: *Through Roses* (Mark Neikrug, Pinchas Zuckermann - DGG), *Thadeus Baird Oboe Concerto* (Koch Schwann) and *Mozart Oboe concerto* (Gramola). Between 1998-2000 she commuted to Bloomington Indiana as an Associate Professor of Music in the Indiana University School of Music and now is on the faculty of the Moore School of Music in Houston.



Stéphane Lévesque WED. 7:30 BASS; TUES. 4:00 BATES

Born in Montréal in 1972, Stéphane Lévesque has held the position of Principal Bassoon with the Montréal Symphony Orchestra since September 1998. He was Principal Bassoon with the National Arts Centre Orchestra in 2003-04 and with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra in 1997-98. He was also a member of the New World Symphony in Miami Beach from 1995 to 1997. Mr Lévesque has appeared as soloist with the Montréal and Québec Symphony Orchestras, the New World Symphony, the Thirteen Strings Chamber Orchestra in Ottawa, Les Violons du Roy in Quebec City, and the U.S. Army Orchestra. He has performed solo and chamber music recitals throughout Canada, the US and Europe, and has appeared at past IDRS conferences in Buenos Aires, Morgantown and Banff. Assistant Professor of bassoon at McGill University, Mr Lévesque is a visiting artist at the Banff Centre. He is also on the faculty of the Orford Arts Centre, where he is a founding member of the Orford Winds. Stéphane Lévesque holds two First Prize degrees, in bassoon and chamber music, from the Montréal Conservatory of Music, where he studied with Rodolfo Masella. He also studied with Stephen Maxym and Frank Morelli at the Yale School of Music, where he received the degree of Master of Music.

William Lewis SAT. 3:00, 2.614; SUN. 7:30, TX EXPERIENCE

My mother knew I would be a musician when my first words were, in order "ma-ma", "da-da", and "record player". I have BA and MM in Bassoon Performance from Ball State University where my teachers included Homer Pence, and Lesley Wilson (Scottish National Orchestra). I moved to Texas to play in the San Marcos Woodwind Quintet and teach at Southwest Texas State University. In 1994 I joined the Austin Symphony Orchestra and Austin Lyric Opera Orchestras as Principal Bassoon. In addition to over 150 professional services each season, I teach band full time at Elgin Texas High and Middle Schools.



Lieurance Woodwind Quintet SAT. 4:30, BATES

The Lieurance Woodwind Quintet has been a resident ensemble of the School of Music at Wichita State University since 1947. The quintet's members serve as faculty artists at the school and also as principle players in the Wichita Symphony Orchestra. Lewis Lipnick MON. 9:00, McC; MON. 10:00, 2.614

Lewis Lipnick is the contrabassoonist with the National Symphony Orchestra in Washington, DC, and Professor of Bassoon at George Washington University. In 1979, Mr. Lipnick was the soloist in the world premiere of Gunther Schuller's *Concerto for Contrabassoon and Orchestra*, with the National Symphony Orchestra, Mstislav Rostropovich conducting. Lipnick went on to perform the European premiere with the Bavarian Radio Orchestra in Munch in 1980, and the New York premiere with the American Composers Orchestra at Lincoln Center in 1982. Both of these performances were conducted by Gunther Schuller. Mr. Lipnick has recently commissioned a new concerto for contrabassoon and orchestra by the Finnish composer, Kalevi Aho. Lipnick will be the contrabassoon soloist at the world premiere in February, 2006 with the the Bergen Philharmonic in Norway, conducted by Andrew Litton. Additional performances of the Aho Contrabassoon Concero in Finland and Norway will immediately follow the world premiere. Mr. Lipnick plays on a Fox/Fast system contrabassoon.



Daniel Lipori SUN. 9:30, McC

Daniel Lipori is Assistant Professor of Bassoon and Music History at Central Washington University. Prior to his appointment at CWU, he taught at the University of Minnesota Duluth. Dr. Lipori received his BM, MM, and Certificate in Early Music History from Florida State University and his DMA from the University of Arizona. His primary teachers include William Winstead, Norman Herzberg, John Hunt, Jeffrey Keesecker, and William Dietz. His publications include: Georg Wenzel Ritter; Quartets for Bassoon and Strings, by A-R Editions in 1999 and A Researcher's Guide to the Bassoon, by The Edwin Mellen Press in 2002.'

Jose Lopez TUES. 2:00, McC

Jose R. Lopez is currently the Acting Coordinator of the Keyboard Department at Florida International University in Miami, Florida, and has been on the piano faculty since 1997. Jose has performed throughout the United States, Italy and Central and South America with orchestras, solo recitals, and chamber groups. A versatile pianist and an enthusiastic performer of chamber music, Jose was a founding member of the Dalbergi Trio, is a member of FIU's resident new music ensemble, the collaborative ArtSouth Ensemble, and was the orchestral pianist with the Florida Philharmonic for 14 years. He has recorded for SNE and Innova record labels.

Timothy Lovelace IDRS COLLABORATIVE PIANIST

Timothy Lovelace is the Ethel Alice Hitchcock Chair in Collaborative Piano at the University of Minnesota. He has been a soloist at five international horn workshops sponsored by the International Horn Society. Mr. Lowe has performed numerous recitals at colleges and universities throughout the United States. A former member of the Utah Symphony, Mr. Lowe is principal horn of The Orchestra at Temple Square in Salt Lake City. William Ludwig is the Carruth Professor of Bassoon and Chamber Music at Louisiana State University. He is also Principal Bassoonist with the Baton Rouge Symphony Orchestra, bassoonist with the Timm Wind Quintet and director of the LSU Chamber Winds. During recent summers he has been in residence at the Brevard Music Center and the Highlands (NC) Chamber Music Festival. Ludwig has performed solo and chamber music recitals throughout the United States and Europe, including performances with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and with the Ars Nova Wind Quintet at the Prague Spring International Music Festival. 


James Onstott WED. 2:00, BATES

Described as "expert" by the Washington Post, "dazzling" by the San Francisco Chronicle, and "soulful" by the Village Voice, perhaps Libby Van Cleve's most extreme epithet was from the Hartford Courant which dubbed her "the double reed queen of the new music world." Ms. Van Cleve has performed throughout North America and has recorded contemporary music on such labels as Tzadik, New World, OODisc, New Albion, Braxton House, and CRI. Organizations such as the National Endowment for the Arts, Connecticut Commission for the Arts, Canada Council, and Minnesota Composers Forum have commissioned works for her. Ms. Van Cleve is the author of Oboe Unbound: Contemporary Techniques, just released by Scarecrow Press. She received her DMA from Yale and her MFA from CalArts. Her teachers have included Ronald Roseman, Allan Vogel, and Basil Reeve.

Flutist Christopher Vaneman holds M.M. and D.M.A degrees from the Yale University School of Music. He has also attended the Salzburg Mozarteum, the Eastman School of Music, and Belgium's Conservatoire Royal. He has performed as a soloist with orchestras in Germany and Denmark as well as in the United States and served as principal flutist of the Reigate Festival Orchestra in England, among other ensembles. The "Dutch Legstand" is used by 90% of the Dutch bassoon players. His newest bassoonstand "The Vonk" is used by hundreds of bassoon players all over the world. Maarten became interested in postures and chairs because of his own back discomforts. He developed this knowledge and now he is giving workshops to improve the postures of bassoonists.

Stephen Wade SAT. 7:30, BASS

Stephen Wade, oboe, received a Bachelor's Degree from the University of Lowell College of Music and a Master's Degree from the New England Conservatory of Music. David Walter, born in Paris in 1958, can boast a most original career: after winning the First Prize for oboe and chamber music at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique de Paris, David Walter quickly gained recognition outside of France as he was awarded Five international prizes one after the other in Ancona, Prague, Munich, Belgrade and Geneva. In spite of such a record, he did not choose an outright soloist career. Instead, Mr: Walter prefers to concentrate on chamber music and teaching, which he deems richer in human values. As a chamber music performer, David Walter has been playing as a matter of course with the Moraguès Quintet since it was founded in 1980. He also conducts small orchestras such as the Orchestre de Bretagne or the Camerata de Bourgogne. Meanwhile, in an attempt to make up for the relatively limited repertoire for the oboe, he has transcribed more than 120 works, and is himself a composer (fourteen works to date).

Esther Wang IDRS COLLABORATIVE PIANIST

Esther Wang, pianist, is an active soloist and collaborator throughout the United States and has appeared on numerous concert series, including the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts in Chicago and the A. Mozart Fest Series in Austin, TX. The San José Mercury News has called Wang "a forceful, take-charge kind of artist with personality spirited and vital", and the Double Reed journal called her a "magnificent accompanist" after the 1999 International Double Reed Conference. Wang received the BM at Baylor University and the MM and DMA at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music where her principal teachers were Roger Keyes and Frank Weinstock. Wang has served on faculties at St. Olaf College, The University of Texas at Austin, University of WI-Oshkosh, University of WI-Platteville, Baylor University, Lutheran Summer Music, the New England Music Camp, and Neighborhood Music School in New Haven, CT. This summer she joins the faculty at Interlochen Arts Academy. She currently teaches at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, MN.

Lecolion Washington SUN. 3:00, RS

Lecolion Washington, bassoon professor at the University of Memphis, received his BM from the University of Texas at Austin, a MM from the Manhattan School of Music, and began Artist Certificate studies at Southern Methodist University where he worked with Kristin Jensen, Frank Morelli, and Wilfred Roberts respectively. He has been offered positions with orchestras including the Houston Grand Opera and performed with orchestras such as the Iris Chamber Orchestra. Christopher Weait WED. 9:00, McC

Christopher Weait is internationally recognized as bassoonist, teacher, conductor, composer, and author. In June 1999, students in the OSU School of Music voted him Distinguished Teacher of the Year. Previously, he was principal bassoonist of Canada's Toronto Symphony, and played in the Chamber Symphony of Philadelphia and the USMA Band at West Point. He has taught at the Eastman School of Music and Indiana University. He conducted the Central Ohio Symphony Orchestra for 10 years. Professor Weait is author of BASSOON REED MAKING and BASSOON WARMUPS. Recordings are on the Crystal, Lyrichord, CBC and Kneptune, Innova, and d'Note labels.

Mark Weiger SUN. 2:00, BATES

Mark Weiger is a full-professor of music teaching oboe and chamber music at the University of Iowa. Weiger received his degrees from the New England Conservatory of Music and the Juilliard School. He has performed double concertos with Chicago's former principal oboist, Ray Still, and presented solo recitals with such notables as Ronald Roseman, Marc Fink, Wayne Rapier, Thomas Indermuhle and Bert Lucarelli. As the first solo oboist to serve as an Artistic Ambassador. he recitaled in Israel, Jordan, Pakistan, India, Greece, Nepal, and Sri Lanka. His solo CDs *Oboe on Road, Grand Sonatas for Oboe, Romantic Road for Oboe*, and *Oboe Wizardry*, have received exceptionally high praise. His premiere of Bernard Rand's Oboe Concertino has since been recorded with a Copland Foundation grant. Arthur Weisberg MON. 4:00, RS; TUES. 3:00, BATES

Arthur Weisberg attended the High School of Music and Art and the Juilliard School of Music, majoring in bassoon with Simon Kovar. He played first bassoon with the Houston and Baltimore Symphonies and second bassoon with the Cleveland Orchestra, before coming back to New York City to study conducting with Jean Morel. He was bassoonist with the New York Woodwind Quintet for 14 years and has taught at Juilliard, the State University of New York at Stony Brook and Yale University. Professor Weisberg is the author of two books, "The Art of Wind Playing", published by G. Schirmer, and "Performing 20th Century Music-a Handbook for Conductors and Instrumentalists," published by Yale University Press. He has composed and transcribed numerous works, including a transcription of the Bach Cello Suites and a set of 15 Etudes for Bassoon in the style of 20th Century music.

Abraham Weiss, Principal Bassoon of the Rochester Philharmonic since 1970, was a student of Norman Herzberg and Sol Schoenbach. He was a prize winner at the Coleman Chamber Music auditions, and attended Curtis Institute.
